## SCHOOL EXPANSION - NEW BUILD

Work begins later this month on a new building that will house three new classrooms and a 6th form seminar room. This follows consultation around plans to expand the capacity of the 11-16 component of the school by approximately 150 students (from 900 to 1050).

The works are expected to be completed soon after Easter 2018 and will also include the conversion of an existing classroom into a science laboratory in order to enhance specialist facilities.

The number of Year 7 students joining us from September 2017 is at capacity, even with the expansion to the number of young people in a cohort; therefore we look forward to the completion of the project as swiftly as is possible.

The new build will be sited between the Business and Enterprise building and the Careers/ Gardens area.


#### YEAR 9 ENTERPRISE DAY 'LEARN TO EARN'

# CLADDING SAFETY

Cladding panels used on the Concert Hall and Nursery extension are NOT the same type as those involved in the tragic fire at the Grenfell Tower fire in London.

Panels made from aluminium composite materials, together with associated insulation, have been blamed for the speed at which that fire spread. This has prompted a nationwide alert to check cladding on buildings including schools. We did this independently, but a survey has also been carried out by a contractor on behalf of Lincolnshire County Council which involved photographing all cladding to ensure it was correctly identified and any appropriate action taken.

A fire safety questionnaire issued by the Government to schools identifies that Branston Community Academy is at low risk (eg the cladding is on a one-storey building) and that fire safety measures are in place. Please be assured that we will be keeping up to date with the national situation and reviewing what we do and our buildings in order to keep everyone who uses the Academy premises safe.

# YOUNG DESIGNER OF THE YEAR
