Once again Branston Community Academy has worked with the NCS (National Citizen Service) to provide our Year 11 students with the opportunity to develop their personal skills outside of the classroom. After assemblies and a workshop during school time, students were asked to sign up for a two-week experience where they had the opportunity for a residential and to undertake a community project. The residential will allow the students to mix with peers from across the county and develop skills such as communication, resilience and problem solving whilst completing many exciting activities. The community project is an activity work on within a group where it is their responsibility to plan and deliver an action that will benefit all those in the local area. Branston students have demonstrated, once again, their desire to excel with 46 students enrolled on the experience which is 10% higher than the regional average for local schools.

We would like to wish all the students the best of luck on this experience and look forward to seeing the difference they will make in the local community.

BOX CLEVER THEATRE COMPANY

We decided to be creative with some of the Covid Catch Up Funding – we wanted to ensure that we were able to offer an enrichment and academic experience for students in Years 7 and 8.

Both years have had the fabulous experience of working with Box Clever Theatre Company. All students in both years had the opportunity to do three workshops, work as a half year groups and then come together as a whole year group to put on a performance. The final performance, for both years, has been filmed by the company and will be put to music so that we can share it with students.

Year 8 worked on skills around 'combat theatre' with students learning moves that could then be incorporated into the final 'battle scene' from Macbeth. Students had to work with precision and control at all times; it really stretched their listening skills and built up their resilience. They worked as tutor groups initially and a real sense of identity and shared purpose was drawn upon. The whole year group then enacted the battle scene, on the school field – it was AMAZING to watch. The students had a fabulous time.

THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH AWARD

It's been a record year for the Duke of Edinburgh award here at Branston. We've taken over 70 students out on 6 expeditions, at both Bronze and Silver levels.

Our shiny new Year 9 bronze students, who signed up before Christmas, have had a whole new intensive training scheme devised to make sure they are as prepared as possible before completing their expedition and I'm glad to say it seems to have worked! They were our first expedition of the season with 4 groups of Bronze participants, in the north of Lincoln around, Nettleham, Welton and Sudbrook. The training seemed to have paid off as none of the groups got too lost and they all made it on time, more or less. After a fun filled evening of tent pitching, dinner and a lovely roaring fire, it was time for bed ready for day 2.... sadly, we forgot to train them how to sleep, which might have been a good idea as some of them were up very late. Despite the late night the students smashed day 2, where they hiked a further 10 miles in the Lincolnshire countryside and finished in mostly good spirits.

Expedition 2 was our Silver practice students, some of which had completed their Bronze earlier in the year back in October. Our Silvers comprised mostly of year 10's with a handful of sixth form too. Silver students are expected to go to higher and unfamiliar ground, so that's exactly what we did. We started at Matlock and finished at Baslow in the Peak District. For some students this came as a bit of a shock as they had not experienced the wonders and challenges that the Peak District has to offer, everything from wide open rolling fields to steep winding passes. Despite this though, they all did incredibly well over the 3 days we were there, managing to navigate, cook, sleep and bond as teams, while having fun at the same time.

At the start of June, we took our Bronze students out to the Lincolnshire Wolds for the qualifying walk, a little bit tougher than the fields of Lincoln, but not impossible. Here our 4 groups took themselves off unaccompanied on their 2-day expedition starting at Rothwell and ending at Ludford. Our assessors checked in with the groups at various points on route with very few issues. The weather was lovely over the weekend which helped and made the team moral thrive and all groups made it from the start to the finish without too many detours. Well done.

Year 10 students had a taste of the working world during their week of Work Experience. This proved to be an extremely valuable week with students making the most of the opportunities available to them. A few of our students this year have found opportunities outside of Lincolnshire, to undertake work experience. We had a range of employers offering work experience to our year 10 students including placements in Construction, Education, Catering, Retail, Finance/Accountancy, Office Administration, Law, Sports Coaching, Design, Engineering and Journalism. One of our students had articles published in the Sheepwash Times, a local publication.

Students are encouraged to find their own placement, in an area of their choice to allow for the most fulfilling experience. Feedback from students, employers and staff that contacted students whilst on placement was, once again, excellent. The skills learned and developed, during the week, will be invaluable to our students for future employment and for many students, work experience has helped to confirm their future career ideas and plans.

GEOGRAPHY DEPARTMENT

We had a great talk on the 23rd March from Hydrologist Claire Kent, she talked to our Y10 and Y12 G&T students from Science and Geography. Claire is an ex-Branston Community Academy student who after studying Geography and Geology at the University of Birmingham has gone onto a career in Hydrogeology both in the UK and currently is in Queensland, Australia. We learnt about groundwater and the importance of hydrogeology.

Claire talked to us about her role as a hydrogeologist and what her work looks like and where it has taken her. It was a really interesting talk and our students asked lots of great questions afterwards.





YEAR 12 WORK EXPERIENCE 20TH - 24TH JUNE

Year 12 Work Experience is embedded into our 6th Form curriculum - the aim being that students have the opportunity to try out their career ideas, for the future, by completing a work experience placement that links with their future plans.

This proved to be an extremely valuable week with students making the most of the opportunities available to them. A few of our students this year have found opportunities outside of Lincolnshire, one student completed a placement in Liverpool, another in Hull. We had a range of employers offering work experience to our year 12 students including placements in Construction Management, Civil Engineering, Education, HR, Retail, Finance/Accountancy, Office Administration, Law, Sports Coaching, Design and Engineering. A further 10 students attended a residential work experience course with the Army.

COVID CATCH UP FUNDING

The government allocated a sum of funding for Covid Catch up; over the last academic year, we have been using this in a number of ways. Throughout the year, we have been delivering a bespoke tuition programme for Year 11 and more recently Year 10 students. We have also delivered a number of KS3 enrichment day, which were aimed at delivering enrichment opportunities, which we hadn't been able to do during the pandemic. The funding has also been used to buy in additional resources for wellbeing, as we look at ways to increase the range of support we are able to offer. We have been able to subsidise trips, which has been very much missed during Covid and this has allowed students to begin to enjoy activities away from the academy. Rising costs had a potential impact but we have been able to mitigate against this. There are still many other ways that we can begin to fill the gap that Covid left and we will contiune to explore these over the next year.

NURSERY CELEBRATORY JUBILEE EVENT

On Wednesday 1st July the nursery hosted a special jubilee event for all the nursery children and families. It was a fun filled morning with special workshops available for families to participate in around the academy sire, including a craft workshop, musical workshop, dramatic story telling workshop and a sports workshop on the school field.

The event was finished off with a large picnic and community cake table on the school field followed by an entertainer.

DESIGN TECHNOLOGY ARTICLE

On Tuesday 28th June the Science and D&T departments took a group of 13 Year 8 and 9 students to Bishop Grosseteste University for their annual STEM challenge day. Students completed 3 challenges against other local schools during the day:

Robotics – students learnt how to programme a robotic vehicle to perform various manoeuvres which they then put to the test on a course.

E-Fit – students used facial recognition e-fit software to reconstruct faces of two 'criminals' - two of the teachers present! They also learnt about some of the issues police face when trying to get an accurate representation of criminals from victims.

Medical Diagnostics – students learnt how to use various pieces of medical equipment and the procedures doctors go through to diagnose patients. Students then put this knowledge to the test diagnosing medical conditions in two volunteers.

Overall Branston students won two out of the three challenges but didn't win overall, losing out to Caistor Grammer overall.



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YEAR 9 ENTERPRISE DAY

On Wednesday 6th July the whole of Year 9 had the opportunity to participate in an Enterprise Day, with a focus on teamwork, career routes and creativity. They started off building a tower using only spaghetti and marshmallows, with an allocated budget to work with. This was a great ice breaker to have the teams working together and to build connections within their groups. They then had the opportunity to talk to one of the many different business advisors, asking them about their careers and the essential skills that future employees may be looking for. The students moved on to completed their own skills audit to identify their strengths against areas of development. The event was organised within the Business Department and the Year 12 BTEC Business students, who continued the explain the different routes the students could consider once they had completed their GCSE's. Finally, they went onto the main task that was designing, creating and presenting an App idea for the school to use. This App was for the students in the school to track their career development progress such as educational progress, awards and extra-curricular activities.

Report
